DOUG'S DIARY

New Handicap System

As you might be aware, golf is aligning handicap systems around the world in 2020 and these changes take effect in Australia in two weeks time. The changes are minimal for us compared to other countries but below is a summary of the main ones. Ben attached a link in his Email and there is a poster with full details on the board in the Members area.

There will be an increase in the GA handicap as the .93 multiplier will be transferred out of the GA Handicap calculation and into the Daily Handicap calculation.

Although maximum handicaps are increasing to 54 in the global system, for now, we will maintain the current daily handicap limits of 36 for men and 45 for women but the Match Committee will monitor this and review.

There is a new "Soft Cap" of 3 strokes - when a GA Handicap reaches 3 strokes above its best point from the previous 12 months, a player's GA Handicap will only be allowed to increase by 50% of the calculated amount from that point. For all the people that have been achieving 43+ points recently, there is now a "Bonus reduction" in handicap for exceptional scores - Players who score 7+ strokes above their GA Handicap will receive an additional 1 stroke deduction from their GA Handicap.

Representative Teams

Sean Lee will manage the Major Pennant Team again this year and Luke Edgell will captain. We have a few new faces in the squad this year but retain our usual blend of youth and experience so we wish them well. Their first match is at home to Monash on Sunday 9th February if you want to come down and see plenty of birdies and guys hitting the ball miles!!

There's only experience in Peter Frith's NPIC Team(!!) and they kick-off their campaign at Bayview on Monday 3rd February and their home match will be played on Tuesday 18th February.

The Masters Pennant competition doesn't start until the end of April so an update on that will happen nearer the time.

FROM THE ARCHIVES

The Programme book

(Yes, — the spelling as used!)

As we await the printed Programme book for this year I am reminded that this publication has a history of its own, but more than that is a palmsized stand-alone history reference booklet of the club and society in general, at any one time. Much of the progress and many of our club's traditions are well tried and tested but equally there have been many changes. These books show when new events were introduced or others just slipped away. In many ways the Programme book is a better record that the Annual Reports. It has always been hard to keep the records of any one year in sync but the Programme book came very close to matching the calendar year.

Now I wish I could say that I can quote from all and any book from the very beginning of the club, 99 years ago, but our collection is not that complete particularly where the men are concerned. Until 1995 two books were printed every year, one for the men and one for the women, who were called Associates until then. The two committees compiled their own fixtures and information for members in a pocket/handbag sized reference book. The Programme book became a combined book at the time of work towards the 5,6, and 7 day categories of membership. In the beginning the men simply called their book — 'Fixtures', but it became much more than that.

A few years ago I searched the books that we do have in the archives to write an article on the changes in Dress regulations over the years. This was from the times when women were not allowed to wear trousers, and men had to wear long socks and then jackets in the clubhouse, through to the two-way fabric stretch discussion! We can also see when a logo was used for the first time on the front of the book and a list of members not only gave contact numbers but also a way for the archives to easily confirm dates of an individual's length of membership and a simple way to check the actual number of playing members in any one year.

The oldest copy of an Associates (Women) Programme to be studied is for the "1950 Season" and following a calendar season it was with a clear beginning, middle and an end. (This book was donated to the club in 2013 by a ninety year old Pat Farley who had been both a member and assistant secretary at the club from 1946-50.) The fixtures show that the summer heat was avoided, at a time when small bags were carried, and it was long before parasols, batteries, carts and 9-hole competitions.

There were also home duties and children on school holidays to be considered. The season began at the end of March and finished in November and where required, play was organised into just two divisions Silver and Bronze. The Office Bearers are listed but appear without phone numbers, members are not listed, but the LGU programme of events covers several pages for the whole 'season.' For example, it would cost 3 shillings if you wished to play at Manly in March 1950 in the 4BBB Par event. Handicap limit 35. Entries were to be received two weeks ahead by mail. Only four general guiding notes appear in the front of the very thin book, one requests that 'A card should be returned for handicap purposes at least once monthly.'



Jumping ahead to the oldest copy of the Club's (Men's) 1963-64 "Fixtures" book we have in the archives (donated by Les Browne); its general content is brief but it has similarities to the book of 2019. It runs a full year from March to March. It is a source of all sorts of information with clear declarations of dos and don'ts from the Club rules, Etiquette, Major trophies, Etiquette, Reciprocal clubs and the Bowls section of the club. As the club changed so did the content. What is different is this 60s book is that the fixtures are only printed on the left hand side of the pages, leaving a complete page blank for notes, times and who you were to play with. The fixtures list also includes the trophy donors for all the Saturday events. As examples on the 6 April 1963 the Monthly Medal trophy was donated by R. Parnell. On 17th August Vic Cropper had put his name on the list to supply the trophy for the Hudson Shield. On October 12th 1963 in the Stableford event it was R. C. Burke's turn. (For those of us who have been here a while we know that all these men went on to hold executive positions on the club committee.) There are also words of wisdom to be noted in the front of the 1972-73 men's March to March Programme book written nearly fifty years ago. It was when A. F. Kinley was President, the club had three Vice Presidents, R. Cordaiy, J.O. Williams, and

R. J. Tilbrock. The Captain was H. V. Cropper. It doesn't say who composed it.

"GOLF

Golf is game which depends a great deal on tradition and long custom for its charm. It follows quite naturally that a Golf Club is a conservative institution. This conservatism should extend to the choice of dress and generally in the standard of conduct on the Course and in the Clubhouse.

It cannot be over-emphasised that the fundamental Rule is consideration to one's fellow member.

The status of a Golf Club may be judged by the etiquette of its members. It is always better to give a point rather than to take one."



By the mid 90's when the combined book was prepared we can see that it includes other sections of helpful information, as well as the items listed above. You are told just how your guests should behave, when you can buy a drink from the bar or what the caterers had to offer. The Billiard room rules were to be followed and Locker room security standards be up-held. For outside you were told the extent and management of the Practice areas. New topics had arrived, such as how Complaints were to be handled and the Rights of Membership. The Handicap division, rules and method of alterations were to be studied! As with previous Associates book it was also a quick way of checking the Pennant team matches for dates and venues.

The modern book includes colourful advertisements and for more than a decade a colour photo has appeared on the cover. We may be moving closer and closer to every part of the club being 'on line,' but it would certainly be a shame to lose this very 'in your hand' easy to use and informative reference book. It is a very worthy publication, especially for new members and a valuable historical record for the old ones!

RULES WITH GEORGE



ANSWER: c is correct (Rule 11.1a applies). If a player's ball in motion accidentally hits any person or outside influence "There is no penalty to any player'. This is true even if a player's ball hits the player, an opponent, or any other player or any of their caddies or equipment. As a result it applies in both Stroke Play and Match Play.
